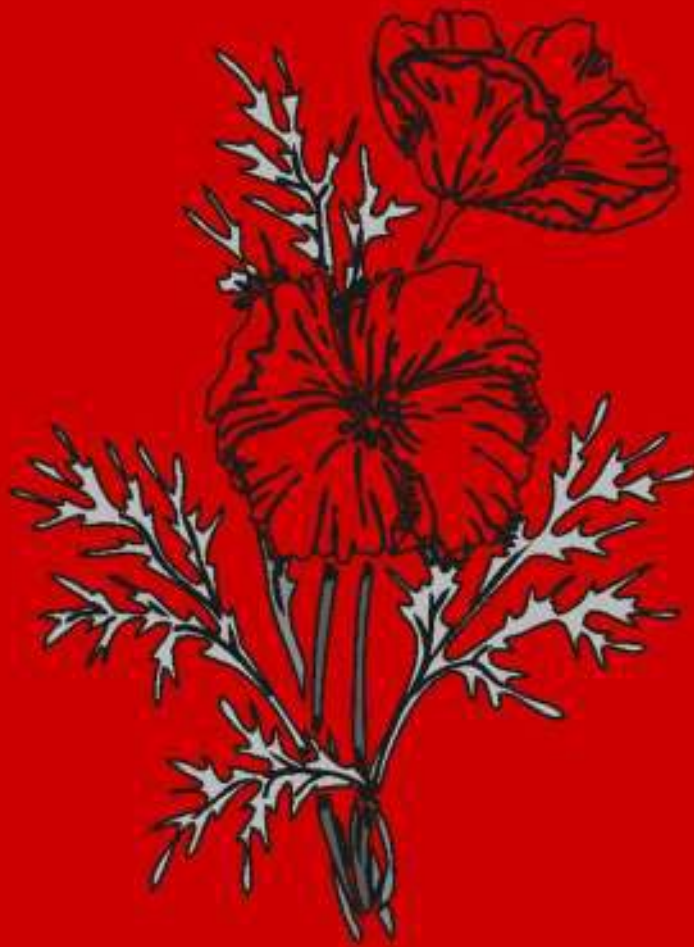

We need old and new pictures or photographs of our villages!

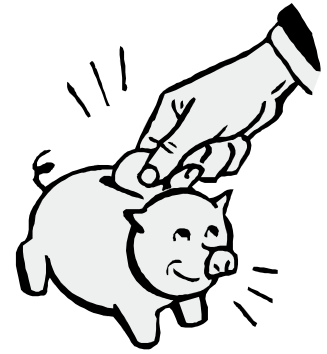

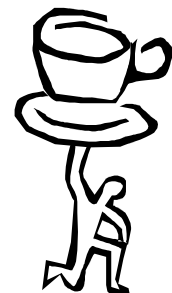

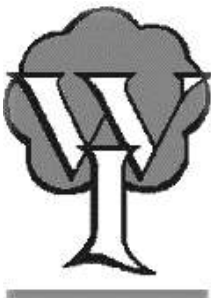

Remembrance

Arrangements were made for services, etc on Remembrance Sunday, 10th November.

In the morning our Standards will parade at Buxton. Wreaths will also be laid at the Horstead War Memorial 10.30 am.

The usual Remembrance Service will be held in Coltishall Church in the afternoon commencing at 2.45 pm after which there will be a parade to the War Memorial for wreath laying. Please walk behind the Band to swell the parade numbers.

You will need no reminding that an important part of Remembrancetide is the sale of poppies etc. Our Poppy Organiser, Mrs Kate Lawrance, and her band of hard working helpers will be calling on you – please give them your support. Perhaps you could volunteer to help with the collecting? Your generosity last year assisted the Legion to carry out the following:

Grants made totalled £9.1m. The Legion has 43,000 ongoing war pensions cases and has represented 6,900 cases at tribunals.

Over 300,000 welfare visits and requests for assistance were dealt with.

£300,000 was given in small business loans and 3,000 people were helped into employment.

10 new taxi drivers are on the road in London though the Legion's training scheme.

400 residents were looked after and 4,200 ex-service people were given a break in the Legion's Care Homes, such as Halsey House.

These are a few of the things you helped to be carried out. The work is still ongoing so we rely on your generosity.

Extracts from the Draft Minutes of a meeting of Horstead Parish Council in the Tithe Barn on Wednesday 9th October 2002.

Tree Felling at Pond - The licence to proceed has been received and Mr M Satchell of Ormesby has been authorised to carry out the work as soon as possible. Mr Benton had obtained the price for replacement trees and gave an estimate of £40 to include posts, ties etc.



Footpath No 4 - A copy of the revised Modification Order had been received. This order corrects the technical deficiencies identified by the Inspector at the hearing on 26th June. Notices will be posted in the local press and displayed at each end of the footpath from 11th October 2002.

Mill - An on-site meeting was held on 17th September with the Environment Agency, Broads Authority and members of the Mill Committee to discuss the proposed electrification of the equipment as reported last month. The meeting also discussed the edge of the car park where small craft were being launched, the silting of the Mill Pool and erosion of pool along Mill Road. The Broads Authority would be using the grant awarded by NEWS to restore the beach area and dredge out the pool.

2002 Annual General Meeting Held at Coltishall Village Hall on 7th October 2002

About 40 people attended this meeting, an exceptional attendance! Without going into details the meeting turned out to be a lively, enquiring discussion on matters of financial concern.

In order to enable local people to acquire knowledge regarding the Association's activities, I feel our Annual Statement of accounts should be made public.

Hopefully our part-volunteer team colleagues who form the management group of Coltishall Sports and Social Club will see their way clear to publish the Club's earnings and expenses. Any profits should be aimed at supporting local community good causes.

Treasurers report for the year 1st April 2001 – 31st March 2002

This is the first financial statement since offering to take on voluntarily the job of Treasurer in November 2001. The previous Treasurer, Mrs D Mileham, retired after six years in the post. From November 2001 a number of reforms have come into effect.

1. By mutual consent Village Hall hire charges have been revised on a fairer equitable basis. Regular users now pay £3 per hour. Other charges are listed in the Marlpit, along with the name of the booking agent. Two replacement room heaters are now in use in the hall, installed at a cost of £950.
2. Insurance cover on all brick-and-tile plus timber built buildings has been updated to take account of the added bowls changing rooms and the play group storage shed.
3. The cricket members accepted proposals to contribute £1 per player, per home fixture, whilst bowls club players pay £5 per week for the five-month summer season. To date we have not had a similar response from the footballers.
4. The car-parks on both fields have received a fresh surface dressing costing £700. In addition to these expenditures the association has paid out:
 - £1,558.30 - Insurance cover on all buildings (the Parish Council pays the bill for the Village Hall and Social Club).
 - £649.88 (2001) & £707.06 (2002) - Council Tax on all buildings (the Village Hall complex gets 80% discount).
 - £219.10 - Water charges on football changing rooms and field.
 - Water and power costs on the bowling green and pavilion, used by the cricketers, come via the Social Club connections. Most CCA supporters will appreciate the fact that our income comes from hiring out the hall, this year amounting to £6,044.76. Up until recent years the Social Club (a sub-section of the CCA) after meeting its running costs, has transferred its surplus cash to the CCA to further local good causes. Hopefully this arrangement will re-commence this year.

In conclusion, it is suggested that the committee continues to review the ways in which financial support is distributed. The spirit of the CCA should be upheld, i.e. helping not just a few, but expanding to others, such as children and young people.

Editors note: We understand that the Footballers have agreed to contribute £1 per play per home fixture.

Cricket



Happily 2002 proved equally successful as 2001 for Coltishall Cricket Club and following Norfolk League Championship success, and with it promotion, the 2002 campaign saw the First XI start their season in Division 3 of the Norfolk Alliance. New recruits Gary Smith and Paul Eggett joined the club from Drayton, Duncan Grant from Costessey and Stuart Gillet, a cricketer with fine pedigree from Sherwood School, arrived adding batting strength and valuable wicket keeping cover.

In truth the First XI were too strong for Division 3 and despite 2 difficult games against Beccles and Garboldisham, went unbeaten in the league taking the title with some ease. The club has always had capable players, but the addition over the last few seasons of quality performers such as Nigel Young, Richard Wood and the emerging talent of Oliver Higenbottam, has turned the club from a decent to good one. Once again these 3 players were at the forefront of Coltishall's success this season.

As for Cup competitions the Club re-entered the Lady Mary Trophy, success in which provides promotion to the prestigious Carter Cup. With good performances in each round, Coltishall won through to the final at Manor Park, Horsford and beat Alliance Division 1 opposition, Acle. Nigel Young was voted man of the match for his excellent bowling and match winning innings of 36.

Coltishall's Second XI also enjoyed promotion this season and were unfortunate to finish runners up in Division 6 of the Norfolk League. A crucial loss to East Harling "A" saw them finish in second spot despite having won more points but because of Harling having completed fewer matches due to weather, at a worse average. Special mention should go to Scott Barker, Shaun Barker and Gary Smith who all bowled well through the season. Steven Fisher led the way with the bat and his season average of 66 was good enough to win the Divisional batting award from the Norfolk League.

A 2002 season review would not be complete without touching on Oliver Higenbottam's performances, which were recognised by the Alliance with them awarding him the David Gooderham Trophy for most runs scored in a season. Oliver recorded 913 runs at an average of 76, with a best of 213, and he still only 21! His efforts have earned him much publicity and of course interest from other clubs. Thankfully Oliver has committed himself to Coltishall for the 2003 season!



During the winter various projects are under way to encourage more of the local community to the club. It is hoped that grant applications for lottery funding will succeed, allowing for improved outdoor practise facilities to be built. The club is very keen to encourage many of the youngsters to the game. Some of our members are undertaking coaching courses during the winter and local schools will be encouraged to work with the club to create a junior section, offering children the opportunity to develop their cricketing skills.

To help some of the youngsters of the community appreciate the need and alert them to the handicap of no sight 1st Hoveton & Wroxham Sea Scouts held a special exercise where they (boys and girls now of course) pitched patrol tents not only in the dark but blindfolded.
