Have You Visited Horstead Mill Recently?

From The Editors



You know how it is, you plan a BBQ several weeks ahead, invite a few friends, then pray it won't rain on the appointed day. Imagine then how it must be if you've invited 360 people for an evening BBQ, the food and drink is all delivered, then it rains all day and into the evening. Such was the situation that faced the Friends of Coltishall School on Friday 9th July when their planned evening BBQ, including outside games and activities, was seriously threatened by virtually continuous rain.

To cancel or not to cancel, that was the question. In reality cancellation was never a possibility. You have to remember we are British, who when faced with adversity (and generally only when we're faced with adversity) all pull together to make things happen.

The school, with the cooperation and enthusiasm of Deputy Head, Ruth Collins, opened up the school hall, corridors and one of the classrooms to the invited guests. The school hall soon resounded to the sound of guitars and drums, interspersed with an excellent girls' dancing display under the inspired coaching of Sue Percy. Our Marlpit 'table' was placed in the corner of the school hall and your Editor, Sid Parkin, spent the evening with an improvised blue-tac earplug in each ear to reduce the noise of the band.



The 'beer tent' had been put up on the school playing field on Thursday (when the sun was shining) and now looked somewhat isolated in the drizzle. This did not, however, deter those wishing to partake in a glass of wine or a pint of Woodforde's finest ales and many people were seen sitting (or had they fallen on) the straw bales strategically placed around the tent.



Gary Fowkes' classroom had been turned into a games emporium with electric powered pigs racing on his desk, ping-pong balls flying over jam-jars and people with strange fishing rods trying to 'catch' lemonade bottles. The room was heaving with activity and enjoyment.

On the school playing field itself, seizing the brief opportunity when the rain desisted from falling, those football enthusiasts from the school (and I know from personal experience that there are many) organised themselves (without any adult assistance) into an impromptu game with 20 players on each side. The game did have two goals, well one proper goal and two jackets, but was played virtually over the whole field, without any referee and was evidently being thoroughly enjoyed.

The 'chefs' at the BBQ cooked non-stop for 3 hours under the protection of hastily erected gazebos, which somehow managed to avoid catching fire from the flames from the sausages. Everybody was duly fed and watered (inside and out).

The evening ended in an auction of goods kindly donated by mostly local businesses. The highlight of the auction was the £165 paid for a Norwich City football signed by the promotion winning team.

To me, the most significant impression from the evening was the integration of the school and the people of the village coming together in a manner that it must have been like in the past. Schools and their playgrounds and playing fields becoming not just a place where you go to learn between 9.00 and 3.30 but becoming an additional and welcome facility for both adults and children of the village at other times.

To those who kept away because of the weather, you missed a good one.

On Being a Parish Councillor!

Life, since becoming a member of Coltishall Parish Council, has been a steep learning curve; one, I feel, I am still at the bottom end of. On becoming chairman of said council, the curve seemed to get an awful lot steeper! However, it's been enjoyable, albeit frustrating at times, and I have met some good people and learned a lot about the village I live in.

Yet sometimes, I feel why do I bother? This is a feeling obviously widely felt, as reported recently in the Eastern Daily Press. Many Parish Councils struggled to get enough candidates; we in Coltishall had just enough, but not enough to warrant an election. The new rules and regulations are certainly off-putting, and seeing the grief the parish council often gets, no wonder many people decide to keep their heads down and not get involved.



Being a Parish Councillor, one is unpaid, frequently berated for things beyond our control and permanently 'on call' (or so it seems!), (even the NHS gives me two days off a week). I am happy to try and help people, and anyone is free to ring me, at a reasonable hour (my number is on the back page of this publication). BUT remember, like several other councillors, I work full time. This seemed to annoy one parishioner, who was cross I wasn't at home during the day, but the CPC doesn't pay my bills or feed me, so I have to go work! I also run my own business, and have a bit of relaxation riding my horse, walking my dogs etc, oh yes and there's youth club! So leave me a message, your name and a LAND line number (sorry, I don't ring mobiles!), and I WILL get back to you.

I would also ask people who write with concerns to feel free to come to meetings, so a good discussion can be had; it's hard to debate an issue fully if we only have a letter to go by. The regular attendance of parishioners to meetings averages about 4! That could speak volumes in itself!

I would also like to take this opportunity to say that the CPC are not the police. Vandalism, motor offences etc are police matters and although we want to hear about them, in the first instance the police should be contacted, if you feel it warrants 999, dial and ask for police attendance; unfortunately, anonymous reports of unnamed people 'doing wrong' are difficult to act on.

Thank you for reading this; I look forward to seeing some of you at our next meeting (Monday, 6th September, 7.30pm in the Village Hall).

Growing Up With Ben

Now Ben can ride his bike we can't keep him off it. He rides it to and from school every day. But where else can you safely ride?

Blickling Park? Yes that seemed a reasonable option. All you would need was a bike rack for the car. A visit to Halfords and the rack was purchased and all that remained was to put it on the car. They will fit it for you but I thought that it couldn't be that difficult. The rack came in a flat-pack box with a set of instructions (like most things do) and I set about the task. It didn't help that the wind was blowing about the instructions and that it started to rain. After 1½ hours, with Julie's assistance, the rack was on the car and it looked reasonably like the picture on the box.

Now to put the bikes on. Well the bikes are obviously three different sizes and whilst the rack was ideal for my larger bike it was less suited for Julie's bike and almost impossible for Ben's bike. Nevertheless, they all went on, were secured with the straps and off we set for Blickling Park. I think we had just gone through Buxton when there was a noise from the back of the car - the bike rack had slipped. At Blickling Hall you can purchase a 'map' for 50p showing the various cycle/walking routes and take your pick according to how many miles you wanted to cycle. All seemed to be going well when from behind there was a cry and I turned round to see Ben flat on his face on the ground having fallen off. Credit to him though, he was dusted down, checked for cuts and bruises, declared fit and off he went again.



It was a good ride and I would recommend it to the novice cyclists to safely gain cycling experience.

Next trip is to Center Parcs where everybody cycles around the Parc and cars are banished to the car parks.

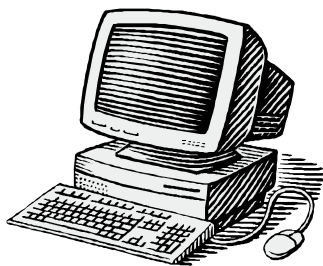
Thanks too, to all the Sponsors from Coltishall and Horstead for giving so liberally in sponsoring the walkers.

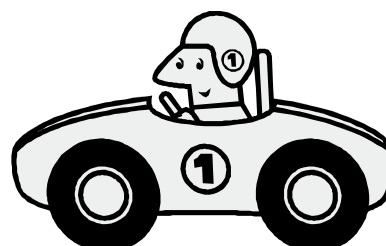

Extracts From The Minutes

Of a Meeting of the Horstead With Staninghall Parish Council Held in the Tithe Barn on Wednesday 14th July 2004

Transport: Councillor Lawrance had, over recent weeks, attended a number of conferences on behalf of the Council, which included North Walsham Area Community Transport Association (Dial-a-Ride) AGM, to which the Council had made a donation. A total of 340 persons from Horstead had been recorded as using the service, over the past 12 months, fully justifying the Council's contribution.

Green Lane: Highways had submitted a plan for a restricted parking scheme at the junction of Green Lane - Norwich Road. This will entail 'yellow lines' at the junction to prevent parking of vehicles which often obscure the visibility for drivers/cyclists turning from Green Lane into Norwich Road. The lines will work in conjunction with the verge posts already installed. Concerns were expressed that the restrictions did not extend further into Green Lane towards the junction with Tungate Way. The Council accepted the proposals, as outlined, with an agreement to monitor the situation.

Co-Option of Councillors: Three parishioners had submitted their names for co-option onto the Council: Mr Richard Gurney, Mrs Catherine Sheldrick and Mr Robert Day.

Currently three vacancies exist and it was agreed that all three should be co-opted and their names forwarded to Broadland District Council.

Mill: Following problems of minor disorder at the Mill, the Chairman had explored the possibility of obtaining a Bye-law to cover 'Good Rule and Government' of the site. It was found, however, that the bureaucracy involved would be overwhelming, so it was decided not to take the matter any further at this stage.

Police Report: Period 1st May – 31st June 2004 - A warning had been issued by the police to ensure garden equipment/sheds were secure following the theft of a lawn mower - Norwich Road. A lap-top computer had also been stolen from premises in the village, and an attempt had to been made to remove agricultural equipment from an engineering site.

Playing Field: The Chairman's monthly inspection had revealed the small side gate was beyond repair and would have to be replaced in the near future. Two tons of sand were to be purchased to improve the playing area in the goal mouths. Due to the constant usage of the playing area this was becoming a regular commitment.

Norfolk County Services were granted a contract to cut and trim the roadside hedge. Work to be carried out in the autumn.

Parishioners are reminded that there is not a Council meeting in August - Emergencies excepted.

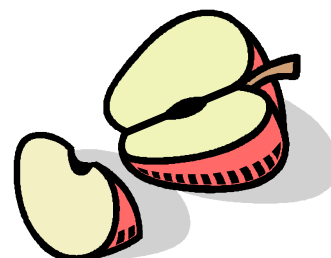

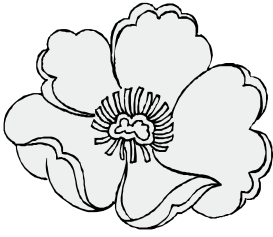

Extracts From the Minutes of the Coltishall Parish Council Annual General Meeting Monday, 21st June, 2004

Speed Reduction: Thanks to the help of Mr Colin Prentice the 30 mph speed reduction has gone ahead in St James.

Foot paths: People had been dumping rubbish on the bridle way.

Access: The Disabled Access was in hand.

Seat at Rectory Road: The Council felt that the seat was in an appropriate location and that if the youngsters of the village caused a disturbance, then the police should be called.

Ling Way: The refuse bins were still being left on the footpath. The Clerk to contact the housing authority.

Dog Bins: Thanks were given to Mr M Spinks for erecting the two new dog bins along Rectory Road.

Shed: The letter from Mr P Cushion was read out regarding erecting a shed for the use of the Youth Club on the Car Park at the Village Hall site. The Parish Council had no objections.

Grass: The new grass cutting contractor had got behind on the grass verge cutting, but hopefully he would be caught up soon.

Verge: Several complaints had been received about the 'cars for sale' parked on the grass verge at Ling Way.

Speed Limits: The letter from Mr Luck was read out requesting a speed reduction from 60 mph to 40 mph along the Wroxham Road. The Parish Council will support Mr Luck's request. The Parish Council will also request the 30mph speed limit be extended to the last property within Coltishall on the Wroxham Road.

Yellow Lines: The lines near the Post Office were badly in need of repainting, in places the lines had completely disappeared.

Vegetation: The footpaths in places were now getting overgrown with vegetation.

Parking: Mr Landamores letter was read out. The Fish and Chip was used as the landmark for the location of the parking problem, not as a source of the parking problem.

Silt and Signs: The Parish Council agreed to support Mr Durrant's request to the Broads Authority for help with the removal of the silt from the drainage dyke and the repositioning of the signs on this section of the river.

Hedges: Does any one know who owns the hedges on Hancock Close? They are very overgrown.

Footpath: A request for a survey had been applied for a footpath along Rectory Road to Ling Estate. We will hear if we are successful within the next few months.

Signs: The village hall/surgery sign keeps moving around.

Speeding: A police presence has been requested along Great Hautbois Road.

Bench: A request for 50% of the funding to support for the supply and erection of a new Bench by the Pharmacy will be made.



News From The Post Office

It's the middle of July and we're still waiting for summer to make a decent showing. Last year the talk was of global warming and tropical weather. This year doom and gloom seems to have settled upon us – poor national sporting performances and the below average weather has not done anything to help the sales of the tourist staples: beer and ice cream! Never mind, with the school holidays about to start, hopefully things will pick up.

With changes in the way benefits are paid and the resulting loss of business, the Post Office has been looking at other services which can help to boost our income. This year several new financial services 'products' are being launched. The first of these, earlier this year, was Personal Loans. Although the interest rates are good and there has been a good deal of advertising, we haven't seen much take up on this. If you are thinking about taking out a loan for a new car, for home improvements, for a holiday or to consolidate credit card debts for example, pick up one of the leaflets from us or just call 0800-169-2000 (but please quote our reference 0801364).



This month sees the launch of Post Office Motor Insurance. The rates look to be extremely competitive and, in a comparison against several other major insurers, the Post Office Motor Insurance came out extremely well, saving considerable amounts for 3 out of 4 motorists. As with the Personal Loans, we can't actually give you a quote directly, but if you phone 0800-169-6500 free (up to 10pm Mon-Fri), the specialist staff will give you a quote over the phone. Again, please quote our reference: 0801364. If your insurance is not due for renewal just yet, there is a chance to win a new Ford Ka – just complete your details on the entry form available from us.

Using these services does actually help support your local Post Office. So long as you quote our reference code (0801364) when applying for a loan or motor insurance, we get some benefit – so please give it a try. Although these services aren't the sole future of the Post Office, every little helps.

Finally, a mystery. Royal Mail bicycles are migrating from Wroxham to Coltishall overnight. In the middle of the night, they leave their bike shed in Wroxham and make their way to Coltishall. This is causing considerable problems for the Wroxham posties as they don't have bikes to do their rounds, and we have to get a van to take them back. Of course, it is just possible they are getting some human assistance! If you have any information about this migration, or spot any abandoned Royal Mail bikes, please let me know (in confidence if you prefer) on 737277.

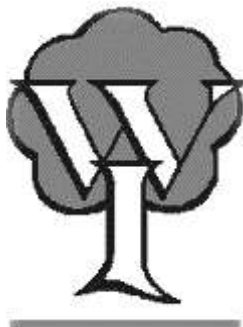

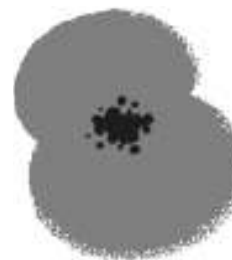

The Royal British Legion

These notes must begin with our warmest thanks to Kate Lawrance, our Poppy Appeal Organiser, to her hard-working team of collectors, and to all of you for helping Norfolk to raise over £400,000 for the Poppy Appeal, contributing towards the national total of £21 million.

Your help enabled the Legion to do these, locally and nationally:- 300,000 calls for help were received 30,000 turned into cases requiring grants totalling £10.3million; 3966 veterans' pension appeals were taken to tribunal - half of them being successful; employment was found for some 3,000 ex-service people and £375,000 was given out in small business loans; a total of 3,568 members of the public went on war cemetery visits, thanks to the Legion, as well as 331 schoolchildren and 7,501 Army recruits; a £15 million programme to upgrade Legion homes (such as Halsey House in Cromer) is halfway to completion.



Our Chairman, Bob Jennings, led the Act of Remembrance at the beginning of our July meeting, during which we remembered Arthur Powley and Percy Parker, two members who passed away recently. Arthur was our Standard Bearer for some years and always made himself available when the occasion required the presence of the Standard.

Our secretary, Benjie Jordan, read the minutes and Roger Birchall, our treasurer, gave the financial report. Bob Jennings gave a report on the county Rally held at King's Lynn and of the participation of the Legion at the Royal Norfolk Show including a parade of Legion Standards. Roger Birchall reported on a Poppy Appeal Seminar, held at RAF Marham, which he attended with our Poppy Appeal Organiser, Kate Lawrance.

Following the business we watched an informative and interesting film on the development of aircraft from the biplanes of World War One to the evolution of the Hurricane whose exploits during the Battle of Britain and other spheres of World War Two were included.
